United by Friendship was founded in 2004 by Deborah Simon, the daughter of missionaries raised in Guatemala. Deborah was active with the Española, NM Rotary Club (now with Rotary Club of Santa Fe) and applied for Global Grants to meet needs she saw in Uspantán. UbF was founded to help with community projects that are not in the scope of funding from Rotary International. Can you say "Bricks & Mortar"? Health clinic expansions, school kitchens and school roofing are three examples. The board works in partnership with the Municipality of Uspantán to improve the health, education and economic development of its people. Volunteers visit the project sites annually to evaluate potential new projects, check on the status of past projects and celebrate the completion of current project with our community partners.

Kerry Quinn was raised in Boerne, Texas. She received a Bachelor of Arts degree from Texas Tech University and completed post-graduate work at the University of Vienna, Austria as a Rotary Ambassadorial Scholar. In 2003, she earned a Certificate in Nonprofit Management from UTSA. Kerry has worked as a non-profit executive for the past 27 years. Kerry and her husband Chris have a blended family of four kids, three in-laws and a new grandchild. She is an active member of the Rotary Club of Santa Fe and serves as the club's foundation treasurer. She was an active Rotarian and Assistant Governor in D-5840 before moving. In May 2024, she joined the board of United by Friendship.

Rotary's response to U.S.'s plan to withdraw from the World Health Organization by Rotary International



Rotary notes the recent announcement that the United States intends to withdraw from the World Health Organization (WHO), a partner in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI). We remain resolute in our mission to eradicate polio. As a founding partner of the GPEI, Rotary has for decades worked closely with all the GPEI government, U.S. and other partners, the governments to end polio worldwide. This effort has reduced the number of children paralyzed by polio by 99.9% since 1988. The global effort to eradicate polio has innovated many times over the years to come close to protecting every last child.

Although this decision creates new challenges, Rotary remains dedicated to ensuring that every child is protected from this preventable disease. We are confident that the GPEI will continue to adapt, to innovate, and to implement effective strategies to keep polio vaccines available for every child in the United States and around the world, especially those in the most challenging and remote regions. The most important decisions leading to a polio-free world are made every day by parents who present their children for vaccination.

We remain committed to working with all GPEI partners to fulfill the promise of a polio-free world. Together, we have ended smallpox, and together, we can ensure that polio becomes the second human disease to be eradicated from the planet.

The role of the Club is to implement and encourage the objectives by its own actions in dealing with the community and by the development of projects that enable members to use their vocational talents in the service of the community. The role of members is to conduct themselves and their businesses in accordance with Rotary principles, and support the Vocational Service projects that the club has developed.

During January, Rotarians are encouraged to focus on this important avenue of Rotary service. Discussions on vocational service can lead to projects that not only develop the ethical consciousness and vocational skills of Rotarians but also the talents within their communities.
