items, please bring them with you to our meeting tonight.


# What is Polio and how is Rotary working to eradicate it

As most of you know, the San Antonio Northeast Rotary Club and the Alamo Heights recently held a Pints for Polio event where together, we raised a approximately, \$1,100 for The Rotary Foundation.



What is polio? Polio, or poliomyelitis, is a paralyzing and potentially deadly infectious disease that most commonly affects children under the age of 5. The virus spreads from person to person, typically through contaminated water. It can then offer it is

typically through contaminated water. It can then attack the nervous system.



As a founding partner of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, we've reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent since our first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979

Rotary members have contributed more than \$2.1 billion and countless volunteer hours to protect nearly 3 billion children in 122 countries from this paralyzing disease. Rotary's advocacy efforts have played a role in decisions by governments to contribute more than \$10 billion to the effort.

Today, polio remains endemic only in Afghanistan and Pakistan. But it's crucial to continue working to keep other countries polio-free. If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyze as many as 200,000 children each year.

The San Antonio Northeast Rotary Club has been serving our community since 1987.




With the Los Angeles Dodgers and the Toronto Blue Jays squaring off in the World Series, we thought we might take a look at Rotary's presence in these two cities.



The history of Rotary in Los Angeles began with the founding of the Rotary Club of Los Angeles (LA5) in 1909, making it the fifth oldest Rotary club in the world. Over time, other clubs formed in the area, including the

Rotary Club of Hollywood in 1923 and the Rotary Club of Beverly Hills in 1924. These clubs have historically served as forums for community and business leaders while also participating in local and global service projects. Angeles hosted the annual Rotary International Convention in 1922. At this meeting, Rotarians adopted the advancement of peace and international goodwill as a core objective, which became part of the official "Object of Rotary". There are currently no less than 19 Rotary clubs in the City of Angels.



the first Canadian clubs and part of the group that helped make Rotary an international organization. The city has hosted several Rotary



International Conventions since then, including in 1924, 1942, 1964, 1983, and 2018. Following the success of the original club, numerous other Rotary clubs were established throughout the city, each with its own local history and community initiatives. Some examples include the Rotary Club of Toronto-Forest Hill, the Rotary Club of Toronto-Danforth, the Rotary Club of Toronto-Leaside, the Rotary Club of Toronto-Eglinton, and the Rotary Club of Toronto-West. 17 Rotary clubs call Toronto, Ontario, Canada home.









Our speaker last week was Sarah Esserlieu Khalil, Director of Development with Great Springs Project. The Great Springs Project is a conservation initiative in Central Texas that aims to create a "green corridor" between the Alamo in San Antonio and the State Capitol in Austin. Its dual mission is to conserve 50,000 acres of land over the Edwards Aquifer recharge zone and build a 100-mile trail network connecting four major springs: Barton, San Marcos, Comal, and San Antonio Springs.







The project seeks to protect the region's water resources, provide recreational opportunities, and preserve natural habitats.

After Sarah's very interesting and informative presentation, San Antonio Northeast Rotary Club President Trina Forcey presented Sarah with a Speakers Certificate of Appreciation and a copy of the Rotary magazine. Sarah also said that she would enjoy an opportunity to speak to other Rotary clubs about the Great Springs Project.


